What is a Service Advocate?

The Service Advocates program offers outstanding students the opportunity to participate in a yearlong civic engagement and service program, providing them with the knowledge, skills and experiences necessary to become active leaders.

Service Advocates participate in regular training, direct service and reflection activities. They practice valuable leadership in the Aquidneck Island community, endeavor to promote a positive culture of service, and increase volunteerism at local nonprofits.

Students in the program perform approximately 100 hours of direct community service at their primary site. They also receive a stipend of \$1,000 per year towards their education.

Ideal candidates for the Service Advocates program are dedicated, passionate and motivated students who are seeking to make positive changes across campus and in the community.



Inspiration to Volunteer:



SERVICE ADVOCATE

BY THE NUMBERS:

The 2017-18 AmeriCorps VISTA conducted an end-of-year survey which yielded these results. Please note that two Service Advocates did not participate in the survey.

- 91% of Service Advocates responded to this survey. 9% did not respond.
- 87% of Service Advocates felt that their participation with the community service office increased their likelihood of them continuing their education at Salve Regina University.
- 87% of Service Advocates feel they made friends and were introduced to new people through their participation in the program.
- 78% of Service Advocates felt that the Office of Community Service has supported them beyond community service programs and opportunities.
- 48% of Service Advocates felt the Office of Community Service should keep doing what it's doing.
- 39% feel their position as a service advocate improved their time management skills.
- 30% of service advocates felt participating in the service advocate program enhanced their academic interests, experiences with their major, and general academic success.
- 30% felt that they had gained job experience because of their service.
- 26% felt that they had improved skills or discovered talents.
- 17% had received jobs or job offers because of their position as a Service Advocate, while 13% have received internships.
- 13% felt that the Office of Community Service should continue to provide recommendations and act as references for students.
- 13% explicitly stated they felt more connected to their community.



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
