PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- Follow Martin Heidegger's writings along the Danube and visit his hut in the Black Forest
- Visit Mauthausen concentration camp, marking one of the 20th Century's darkest times
- Travel to the most influential cities in Hungary, Austria, and Germany, all within ten days

Academic Focus

Following the path of the documentary film *The Ister*, students will visit sites along the Danube that formed the backdrop for many of the significant socio-political events of the 20th Century. This course will explore the forces that influenced Martin Heidegger's writing and further demonstrate the resounding impact which World War II and the Holocaust would have on Europe in the second half of the 20th Century. In short, students will receive firsthand experience of the conditions which shaped continental philosophy over the last century, including the roles which technology, art, and politics played.

Course Expectations

Students must attend the day-long workshop, intended to cover the travel itinerary and its relation to the assigned readings. Students are to read the assigned texts before departure. Pre-departure orientations and meetings are mandatory.

Accommodations

Lodging: Participants will share double occupancy rooms with private bathrooms in tourist class hotels.

Meals: The program fee includes breakfast at the hotel and 2-3 group meals. Participants will need to purchase lunch and dinner on most days.



Eligibility Requirements

- Open to students in the PhD Humanities program and undergraduates and others with the approval of the Program Leader
- Availability of academic credits to fulfill degree requirements. Partial discount for those not seeking credit.
